By providing quality academic programs in a schedule that allows for student freedom and choice, we are confident that every student will be prepared for their next chapter in life.


Every day, the District 99 community works to provide a foundation for students to confidently pursue a future of their choosing.

An Equitable & Supportive Environment

"Build community, foster belonging and value the diverse perspectives of every member of our community." Students and staff connected with one another during story and idea exchanges. These intergenerational learning experiences provide everyone a time and place to learn more about—and gain empathy for—one another.

"Ensure safe and sustainable opportunities for all students and families, including access to District resources." Enrollment continues to rise at the Transition 99 Center, our program for older students with special needs, and we are expanding the facility to accommodate students with a \$4.9 million funding plan that includes over \$1 million in interest income from the 2018 Master Facility Plan. We also added a new 6 p.m. Activity/ Athletics bus to increase access for students to participate in after-school activities.

Growth of Student Ownership & Agency "Demonstrate students are valued partners by integrating student voice and choice in their learning and personal growth." Principals have formed student advisory teams to provide regular input on important topics; students have also served on interview committees to help select school leaders.

"Develop experiences that foster an understanding of their role as global citizens." Our new schedule creates time for more service opportunities. This year, students made paracord bracelets and wrote letters to those serving overseas for Operation Gratitude.


We are always recruiting for our vital support staff positions; **41**% of our support staff members are also community members, who receive benefits and most follow the school schedule.




