

### Academics





#### **Challenging Academics, Supportive Programs**

District 99 offers over 200 distinct courses, including Honors and 27 Advanced Placement (AP) courses. AP courses are rigorous, preparing students for college-level coursework. Many courses support STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) learning, including AP Environmental Science, Calculus and Computer Science. We also offer 4 "Project Lead the Way" (PLTW) engineering courses, through which students can earn college credit and scholarships.





#### Raising expectations for all students

District 99 offers a host of targeted interventions for our students who need extra help. In addition, in 2013, we launched AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination), a college prep program for students traditionally underrepresented in higher education. It provides academic instruction, tutorial support and college and career activities for select students. The inaugural class will graduate in 2017.



## Student Achievements

#### Student Achievement Continues to Rise

- The ACT average is 23.0, up from 22.6 last year, and ahead of the state and national average of 20.8.
- Student growth, as measured by test scores over time from when students first enter high school through their junior year, is 37.4%, up from 36% last year.
- Participation in AP and Honors courses is up to 48% of all students, up from 45.6% last year.
- More students are stretching themselves and taking AP exams. This year, 994 students took 2,050 AP tests.
- Graduation rate is 94%-up from 91% in 2012.
- 79% of graduating seniors enroll in a 2 or 4-year college or university.






## Technology



#### A Leader in Online Learning

Technology has dramatically changed how students learn--and what they need to learn. Every student at District 99 has a Chromebook for 24/7 access to content. Students have infinite online resources, can collaborate with others, and can check assignments and grades easily. This year:

 Google selected District 99 as an "Education Reference District." The elite designation signifies our innovation and excellence in using technology for positive learning outcomes.  Director of Technology Rod Russeau earned the "Certified Education Technology Leader" designation from the Consortium for School Networking, proving mastery of what's needed to lead technology initiatives successfully.





## Facilities

Our facilities cover one million square feet. We invest up to \$2 million per year from our operating funds for ongoing maintenance and repairs and small scale upgrades. This year, we spent \$1.3 million in projects, which included replacing roofs at DGS and upgrading the DGN baseball field.







#### **Master Facility Plan**

Technology has impacted every classroom and facet of how we teach students, and we need to adapt. With our Board of Education, we've identified priorities for modernization. In April, 70+

community members attended community meetings to learn about our ideas and tour the schools. This fall, we will hold additional community meetings.

Large-scale improvements will require **community support and approval**. In 2019, the district will pay off existing facility bonds from the additions built in 1999. The timing provides an opportunity to address needed facility updates.





### Financial





We strive to deliver the highest quality educational program in the most cost-effective and responsible way possible to our community. Our instructional expenditure per pupil is \$10,274; the pie charts below reflect our Operating Funds for the 2016-17 school year:





District 99's approach to debt management is prudent and focused on being responsible to our taxpayers. In addition to our annual expenditures, our Operating Funds covered \$2.7 million of annual debt service costs for facility improvements – instead of raising new debt service taxes. Also this year, we:

- reduced our annual budget by \$1.1 million to help build reserve levels, adding stability during the payment shortfall period from the state.
- saved \$730,000 by refinancing debt certificates issued in 2007

## "Certificate of Excellence"

from the Association of School Business Officials International for the 18th year in a row, reflecting financial transparency and information about our financial condition that goes beyond minimum requirements.



District 99 has the 2nd lowest total tax rate of the 7 high school districts in DuPage County. It is \$1.96 this year—ten cents lower than last year.
